It was the middle of winter in January. Andrew found himself on a park bench, miserable, drunk, and totally out of options. Next to him was a suitcase packed with items he hastily threw together when his family placed a protective order on him after a drunken argument. "I was hopeless," he recalled sadly. "I had burned all my bridges."

Andrew was a self-described "raging alcoholic" – the kind that would even drink rubbing alcohol to pacify his addiction. "It was just bad," he shared with regret. He had tried a 30-day rehab and was able to get sober, but still didn't have the tools to handle life and prevent succumbing to his alcoholism again. His family was "done with him", and everything that was secure in his life collapsed. After losing his job and getting a DUI, he had nothing left.

Homeless and alone in that park, Andrew made a last plea call for help to his sister in Florida. She reminded him of a news segment she saw about Phoenix Rescue Mission and urged him to call. That moment changed the trajectory of Andrew's life, as he felt "something guiding him here."

Andrew now realizes that "something" was the Lord's

mercy, and after more than 15 months in our recovery program at the Transforming Lives Center, his story of shame and brokenness has been redeemed. "All the things that were lost have been added back into my life," he described with a newfound joy. Andrew now has healed relationships with his family and begun work with other men at the Mission. Most importantly, he discovered the one thing he needed for all of this to be possible.

"There was definitely something missing from my life... and that was connection with God. That's what I have gotten here."



"I could have died many times over."

Carol's statement hung heavy, describing her harrowing last two years where she had been on the brink of death more than once. Breast cancer, a coma, temporary paralysis and an infected chemo port almost took her life. After she lost two of her own siblings to cancer in the same season, she had come undone. Despite God healing her body in a miraculous way, she was trapped under the weight of a deep depression and an overwhelming sense of worthlessness.

In September, after Carol's disability was cut off, she had no money and no way to put food on the table for her and her grandson. "How are we going to eat?" she recalled asking herself, panicked. She heard about our Hope for Hunger Food Bank and arrived that day to receive a food box. But something else happened that Carol didn't expect. She was deeply impacted by the joy of the people serving and by the way it was run. So much so, that she asked if she could

come and be a part of serving there, too. "I felt useless and lacked purpose. But this place has changed me. It makes me feel so good inside to help change people's lives."

Carol has been consistently serving at the food bank since her first visit and describes her time there as "better than therapy." It has given her a true sense of community and connection after emerging from an incredibly dark and traumatic time.

Marcos was intently reading a book at a bus station off Dunlap Avenue in Phoenix in a Seahawks jersey, unaware that his life was about to take a dramatic turn.

Ben parked the Street Outreach van and prayed to himself as he walked up. As a case manager with the Mission, Ben was used to approaching men and women who appeared to be experiencing homelessness to offer them a lifeline off the streets. With Marcos, he couldn't quite tell. "Honestly, I felt a bit apprehensive because it can be awkward if you assume someone needs help and they don't."

Ben followed the Spirit's leading, and Marcos opened up to him, sharing that he had been living on the streets for two months battling an intense meth addiction. He invited Marcos to the men's campus for screening and put him up in a hotel until he could start his intake. "I'd come by to pray with him and bring him food from our food bank. I hoped he'd still be there when I came. And he was. He told me, "This is so God. God showed up in an amazing way for me." He was just so excited," Ben described.

"That's what I love about street outreach — all of these divine appointments. People on the streets are so accessible. This tends to be where God does His work, at our rock bottom." Two days later Marcos began his journey of recovery at the Mission, where he found a hope greater than the world had ever offered.

And that book Marcos was reading? It was the Bible. Specifically, the Message version of Colossians 1:19. God was stirring Marcos' heart long before his encounter with Ben, reminding him of an everlasting love that spans all of our stories - from beginning to end.

"It makes you aware that God is completely sovereign. He sees people's needs and He meets them, very practically," Ben said with a smile. "That's my favorite part."

On the outside, Aisha appeared to have it together. She had a job, an apartment and a car. But daily she wrestled with inner turmoil; a secret life of drug addiction and dysfunction in her relationships. "My life was constant drama."

Aisha had grown up in a religious cult and suffered traumatic abuse at the hands of her stepfather. To survive, she became a master at detaching from her feelings and denying herself the very thing she needed most: healing.

Aisha gave birth to twins and tried to stop using, but her postpartum depression created a perfect storm. Not knowing where else to turn, she locked herself in a dark closet and cried out to God. With trembling fingers, she dialed the Changing Lives Center (CLC.) When the voice on the other line described that the program was a year, Aisha was resistant. He asked her something that she couldn't shake long after she hung up: "What's a year to save your life?"

Aisha finally let go. "I was looking for any way out, but something supernatural moved me through these gates. For the first time out of the destruction of my life, I felt peace," she described through tears.

All of her walls crumbled as the love of Christ flooded in. The CLC offered her "soft truth, tough love", and a sisterhood that carried her through the valley.

Three years later, Aisha's recovery has come full circle. She graduated and works with the CLC's alumni program, connecting women with the resources they need to thrive.
